Running Statement: I am running for City Council because I believe in strong civic engagement and I think the unique skills I gained in the Marine Corps will allow me to continue to grow Brunswick and attract more people to live, work, and visit here in the future.

1.) We have been working on downtown revitalization for over thirty years. Some progress has been made. What steps would you suggest to continue or improve the process?

Answer: Maintaining the historic relevance of Brunswick City is a top priority. I would work to ensure any revitalization projects benefit the residents of Brunswick, while not negatively impacting the community or current downtown aesthetics. I believe we need opportunities that will bring revenue to downtown and help preserve current and future historic buildings. I want to help maintain the structures in order to avoid additional buildings becoming derelict and at risk of being removed. I will work with the Council, County, and State to find unique ways of enticing minority-owned small businesses to our community through grants, small business loans, and other mechanisms.

- 3.) Do you feel that Galyn Manor and Brunswick Crossing are fully neighborhoods of greater Brunswick? If not, how would you suggest accomplishing that?

 Answer: Brunswick Crossing and Galyn Manor are as much Brunswick as the people who live in the oldest houses downtown. We don't all wear shirts that say what part of the city we are from and we shouldn't make a face when we hear someone is from the upper communities. I think community wide events such as the recent movie night are a great way of bringing our neighborhoods even closer together and I would love to see more intercommunity events like a food truck night or recreational sports events.
